

Document Recording Fees* Dashboard

The number of documents recorded directly impacts the amount of funding available. Below is a dashboard providing a statewide roll-up of a month-to-month view, this may vary by county.



*In 2006, the legislature passed the Homelessness Housing and Assistance Act which created the "document recording fee" as the revenue source to address homelessness in our state. Fees are collected by county auditors when a legal document is recorded such as deeds of trust, leases, mortgages and other items related to property ownership. Sixty-six percent of the fees are retained by local governments for homeless housing activities as directed in county plans and thirty four percent are remitted to the state Home Security Fund, which funds the Consolidated Homeless Grant. The current fee is \$48 per document.

Effective Community Based Solutions to Encampments

To end homelessness for everyone, we must link people experiencing unsheltered homelessness, including people sleeping and living in encampments, with permanent housing opportunities matched with the right level of services to ensure that those housing opportunities are stable and successful. It is only through the provision of such opportunities that we can provide lasting solutions for individuals and communities. Across the country, many communities are wrestling with how to create effective solutions and provide such housing opportunities for people experiencing unsheltered homelessness. - The formation of encampments do not represent an end to homelessness; rather encampments are an indication of a critical need to create more effective local systems for responding to unsheltered homelessness.
- Strategies that make encampments an official part of the homelessness response system can
 distract communities from focusing on connecting people to permanent housing solutions and
 create costs to ensure safety, security, and well-being.
- People sleeping in encampments are diverse and interventions must address a range of needs,

challenges, and goals.

• The forced dispersal of encampments is not an appropriate solution and can make it more difficult to achieve lasting housing and service outcomes to its inhabitants.

<u>Impact of Housing Assistance on Outcomes for Homeless Families</u>

An Evaluation of the Ending Family Homelessness Pilot

The Ending Family Homelessness (EFH) pilot program, which began in April 2013, provides rapid re-housing and other services to homeless families receiving Temporary Assistance for Needy Families (TANF). We examined outcomes over a 12-month follow-up period for EFH participants relative to three separate statistically matched comparison groups: those in non-EFH rapid re-housing, those in transitional housing, and those who remained homeless. Compared to TANF parents who remain homeless, EFH participants are significantly more likely to remain on TANF, progress along the WorkFirst program continuum from barrier removal to employment, be employed, and have higher average annual earnings. They are significantly less likely to be sanctioned while on TANF, experience a return to homelessness, or be arrested.

Predicting Homelessness among Low-Income Families on TANF

This report identifies key risk and protective factors associated with the start of a new homeless spell among parents receiving Temporary Assistance for Needy Families (TANF). Three key findings emerged: 1) recent homelessness puts families at increased risk while receipt of public housing serves as a strong protective factor, 2) criminal justice, behavioral health, and family violence issues increase the risk of future homelessness, and 3) income from work earnings or public assistance can buffer parents from homelessness, while being sanctioned for non-compliance with TANF requirements can place them at increased risk.

For Profit IRS Search Update (also in FAQ)

Below is an example of another way to document that an entity is <u>NOT a nonprofit</u>. You need to do this when you find a business name after conducting the County Parcel Search. The original method is also still valid so choose the procedure that works best for you.

- 1. Down load the entire database of 'charitable' organizations (this can take a minute or two.) Commerce suggests you document a procedure that you do this every 6 months and save to a desktop. http://apps.irs.gov/app/eos/forwardToPub78Download.do
- 2. Control + F and type the name of the property owner as stated on assessor's report
- 3. Print screen if no results are found:
