## Introduction

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July 1, 2009 was the third anniversary of the roll out of the Washington InfoNet data collection system, and we are excited to share with you this information about the data collected in the past year.

As you may know, InfoNet is a data collection system for crime victim service providers in Washington State. InfoNet was designed by Office of Crime Victims Advocacy in partnership with DSHS Children's Administration to ease data collection, improve the quality and quantity of victim service data available in Washington State, and provide an integrated means of data collection for victim services providers.

InfoNet is designed to ensure program sites easily comply with a variety of federal and state reporting requirements, but it is also intended to provide agencies with a flexible and user-friendly data collection tool that may be used for analyzing information in a variety of ways.

InfoNet users may generate many reports automatically from the InfoNet website. For more complex or detailed analysis, users may request custom reports from OCVA via e-mail. Since InfoNet rolled out in 2006, OCVA has compiled over 1,000 custom reports for individual agencies. Agencies have used InfoNet data for grant solicitations, staff workload analysis, board and community presentations, city and private grant reporting, and much, much more. There are currently 547 InfoNet users, from 131 agencies. As of November 1, 2009 there are 167,331 primary client intakes in the InfoNet system, including over 59,000 intakes imported from OCVA's historical sexual assault data. More than 985,000 individual service contacts have been entered into the system since its inception. This presents compelling information about the amazing work done by victim service providers in Washington State.

The following report is only a portion of the data collected over the past year. We hope that agencies will find this information useful, not only as a way to realize the power of the work being done with crime victims throughout the state, but also as an invitation to explore new ways that each agency can look at its own data and the stories that data can tell.

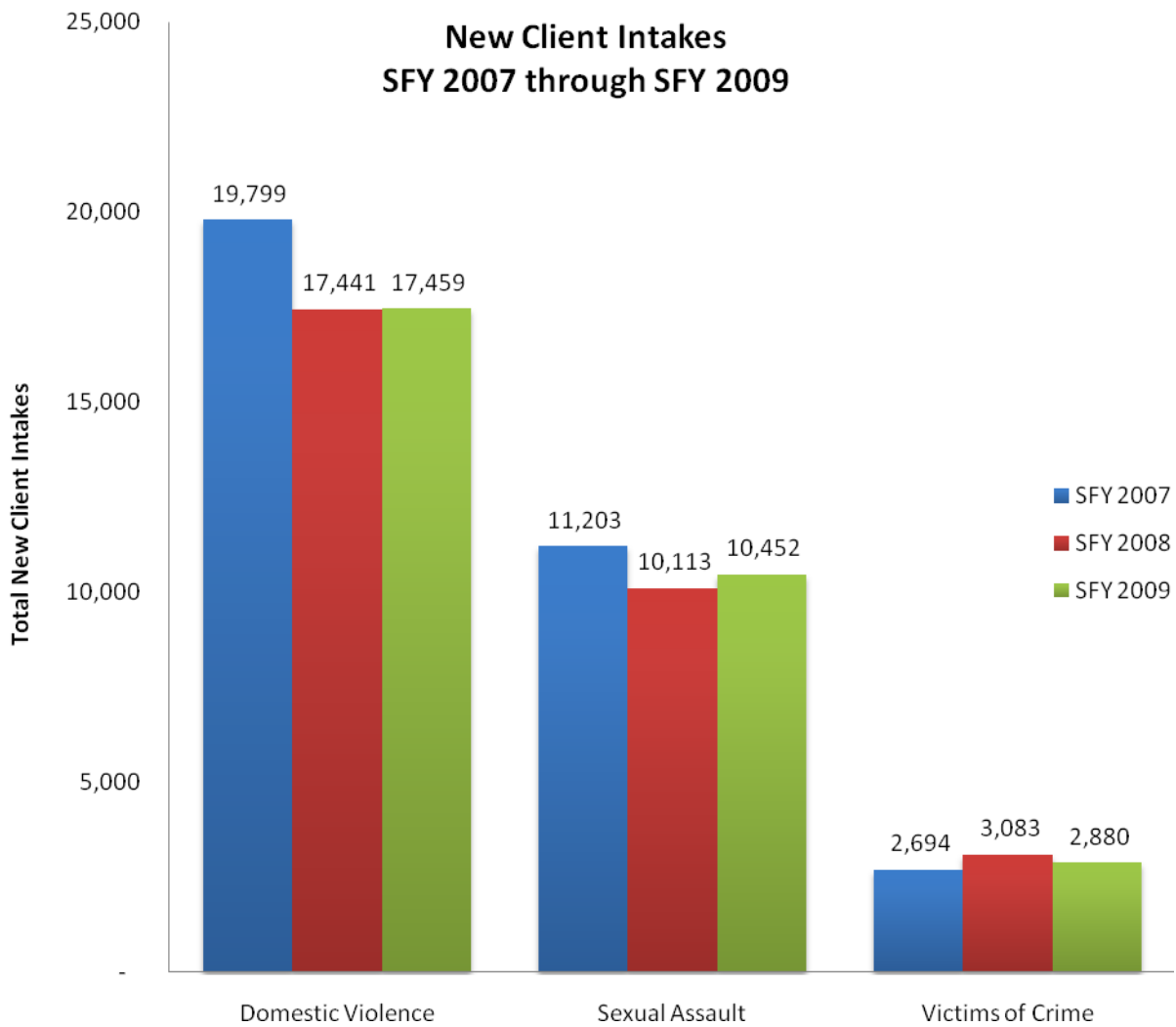
## **Client Intakes SFY 2009**

The following section will look at the client intakes for clients who were seen for the first time in state fiscal year 2009.

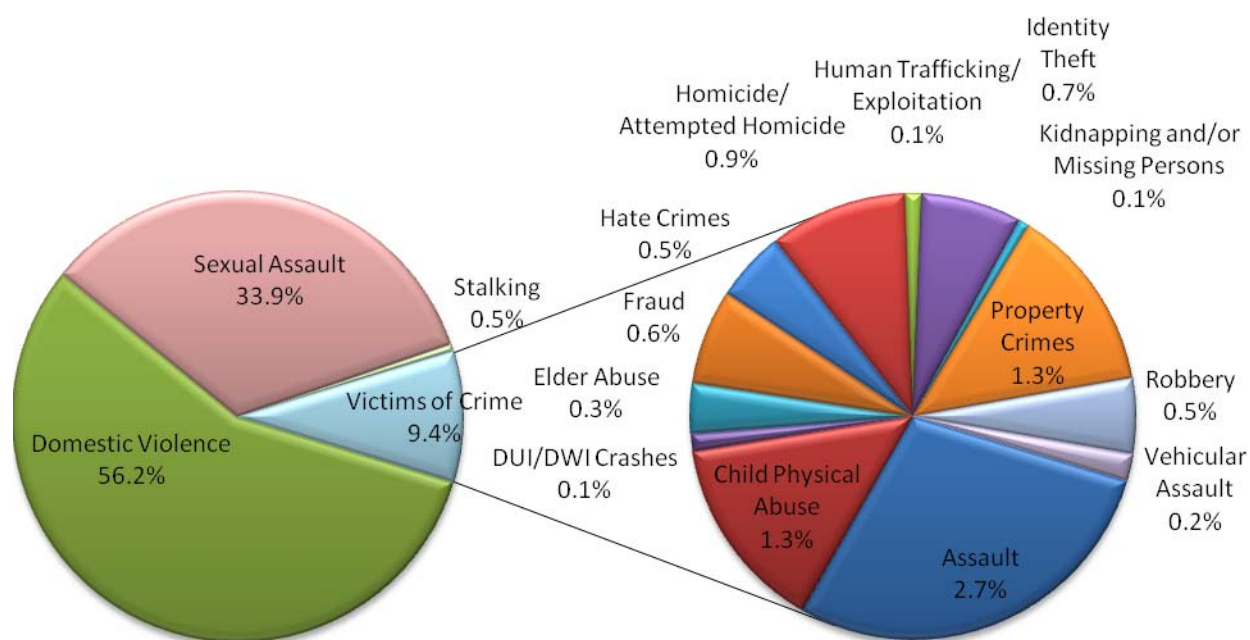

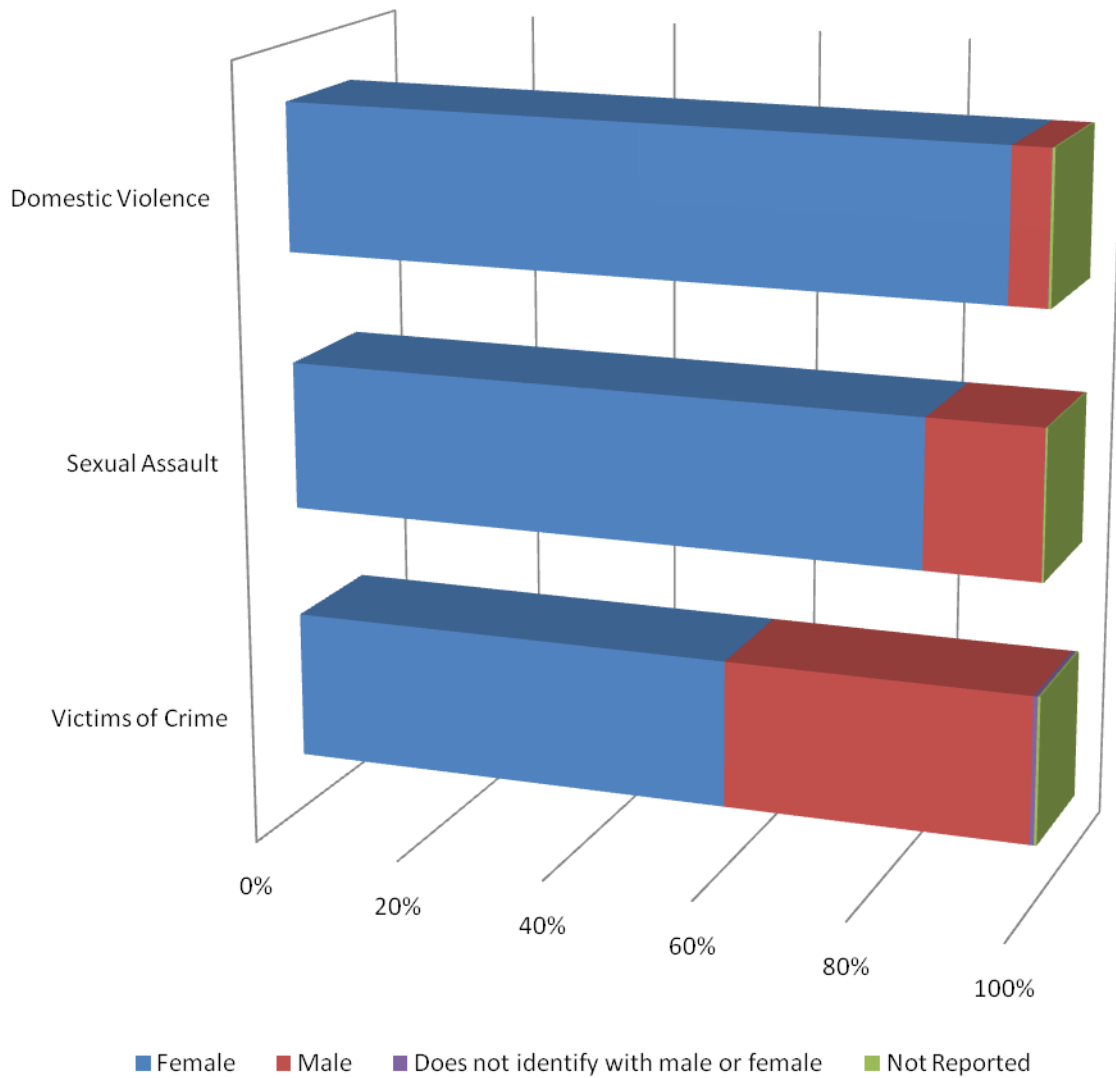

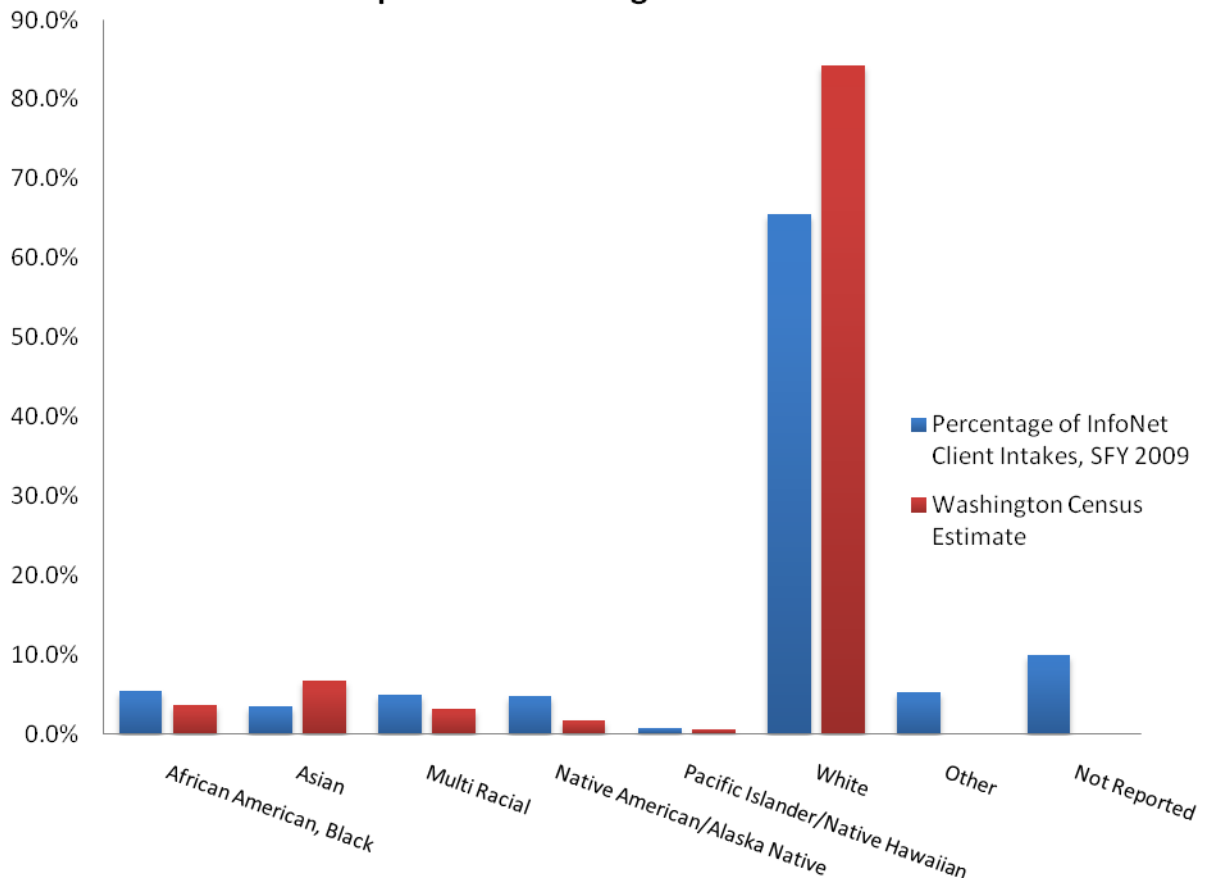

Compared to Washington State Census**

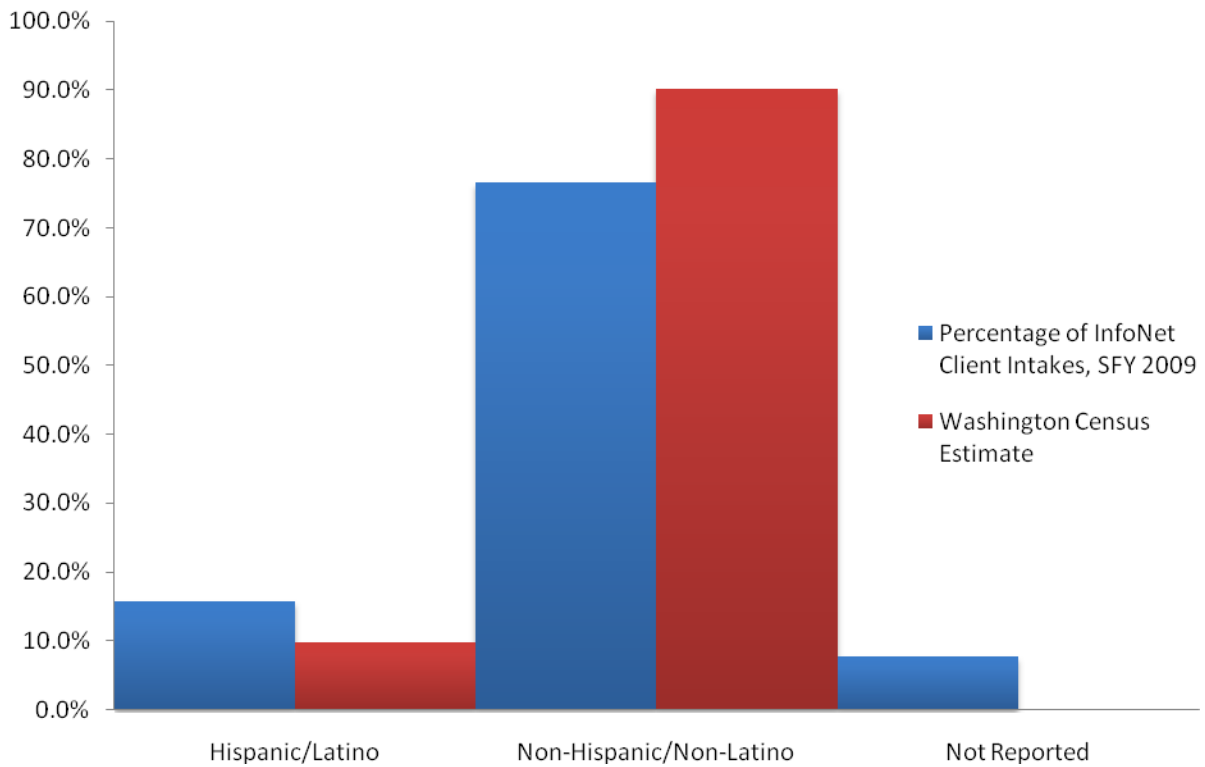

**2009 Client Intakes By Ethnicity Compared to Washington State Census**

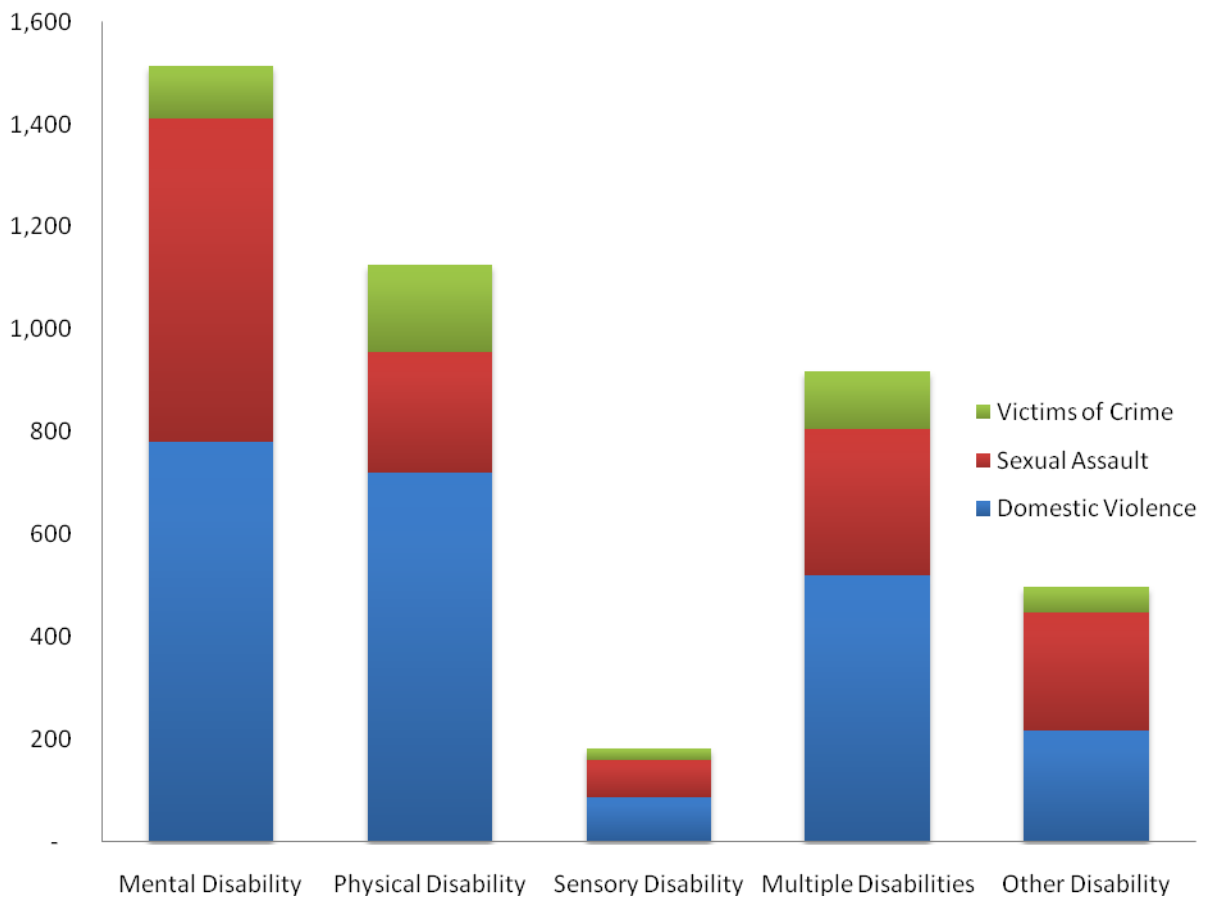




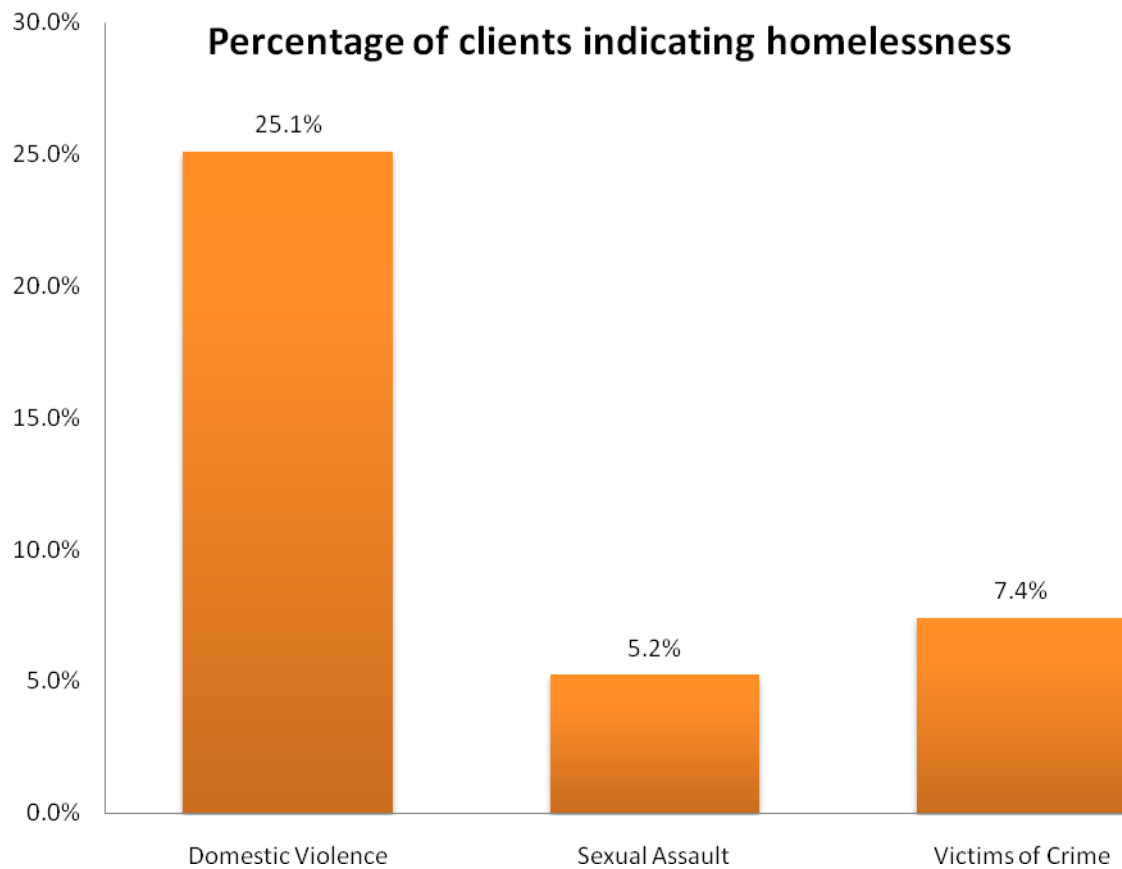

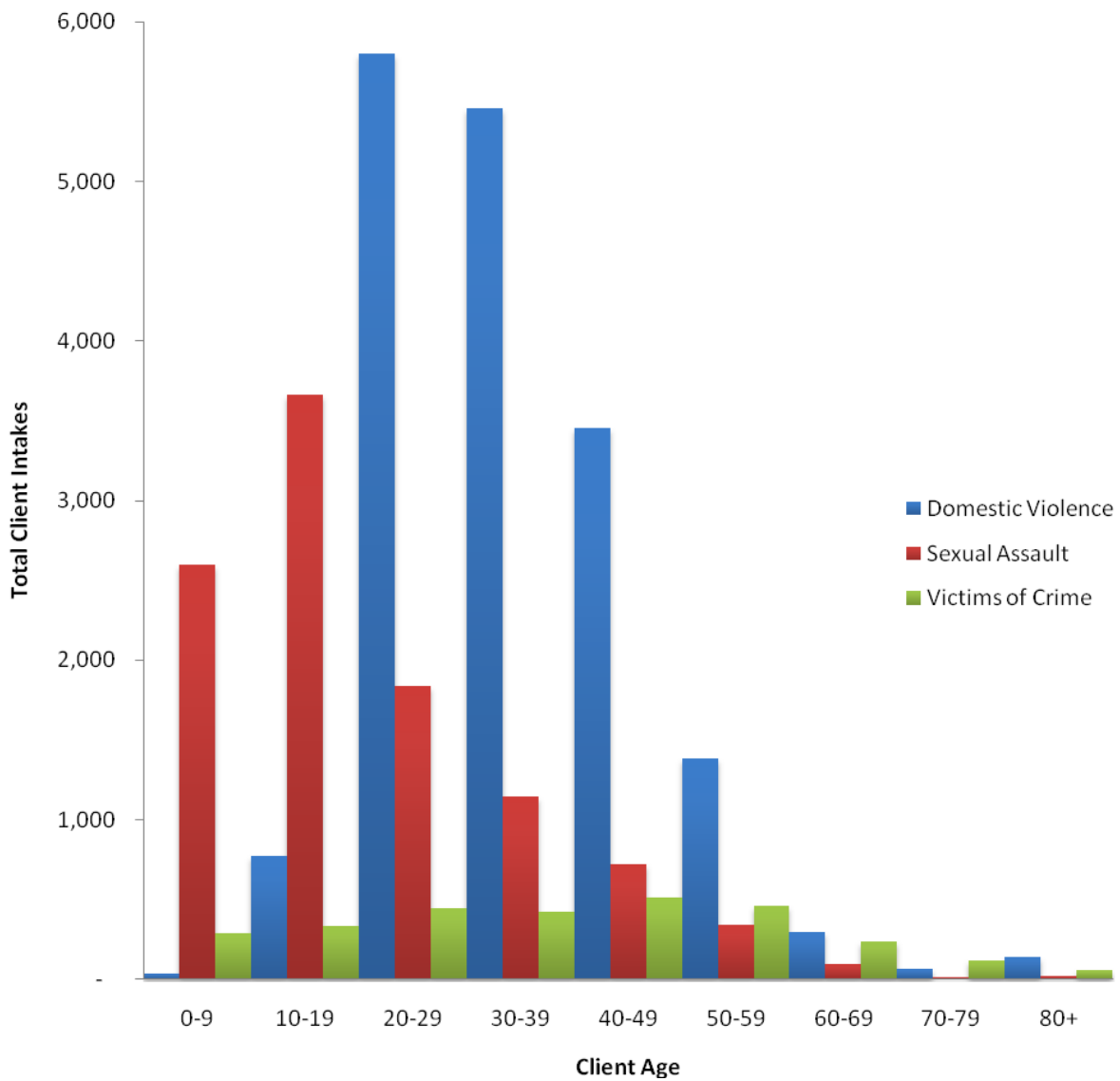

## Client Intakes: Optional Data

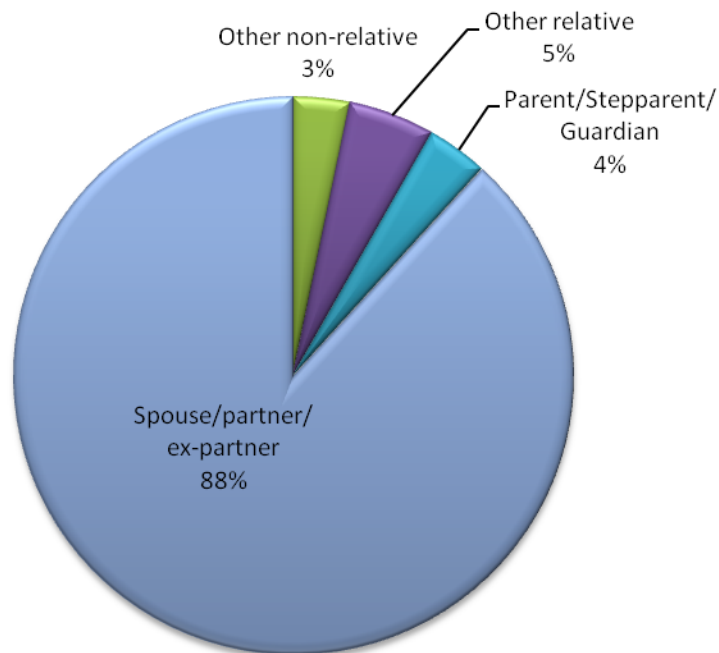

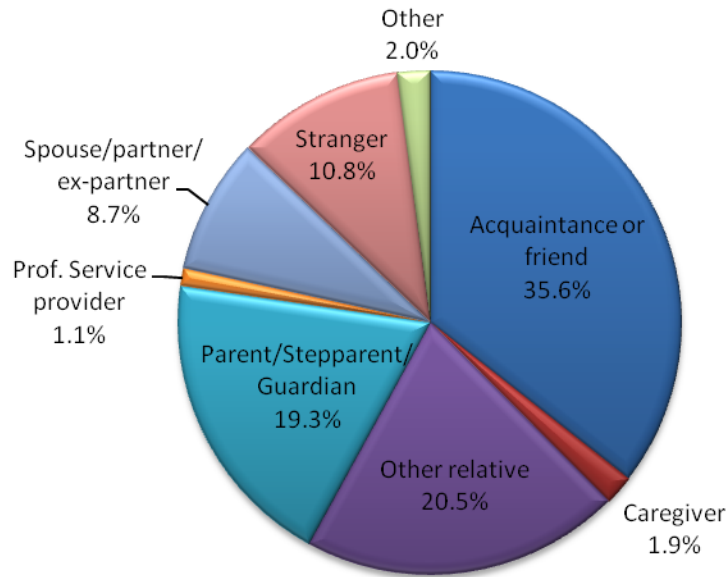
## Offender Relationship to Client Domestic Violence

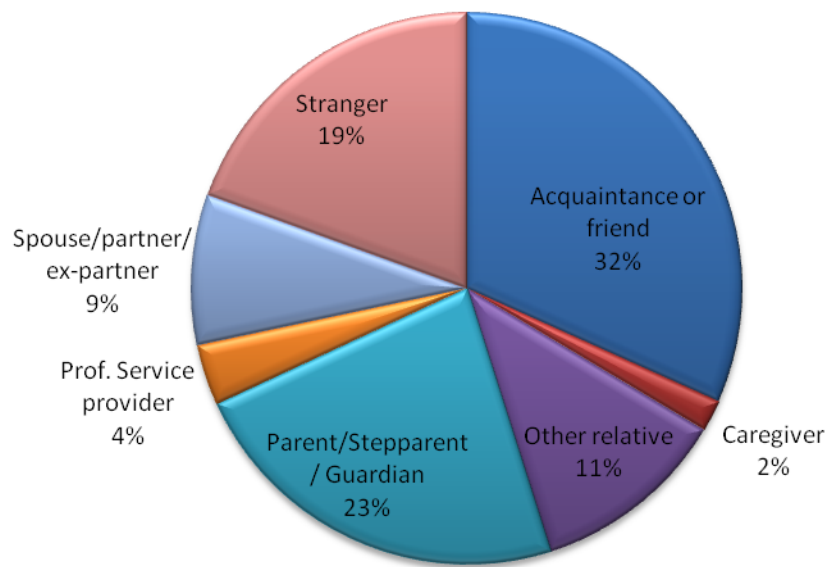

(excluding those not reported)



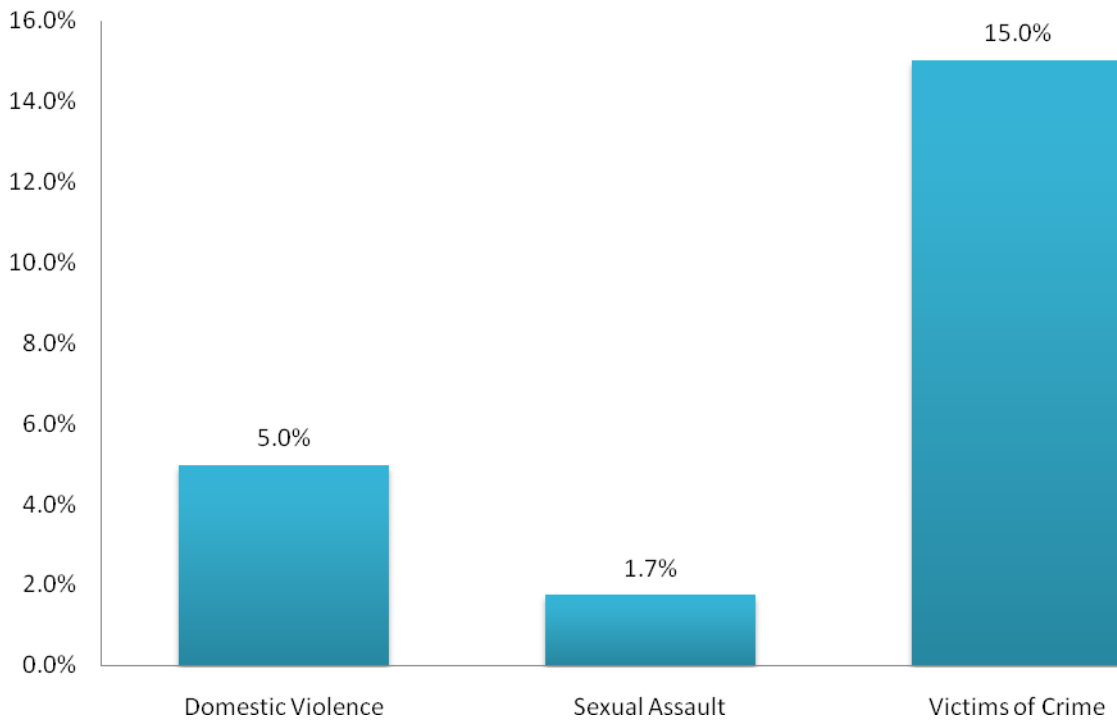
**Offender Relationship to Client**

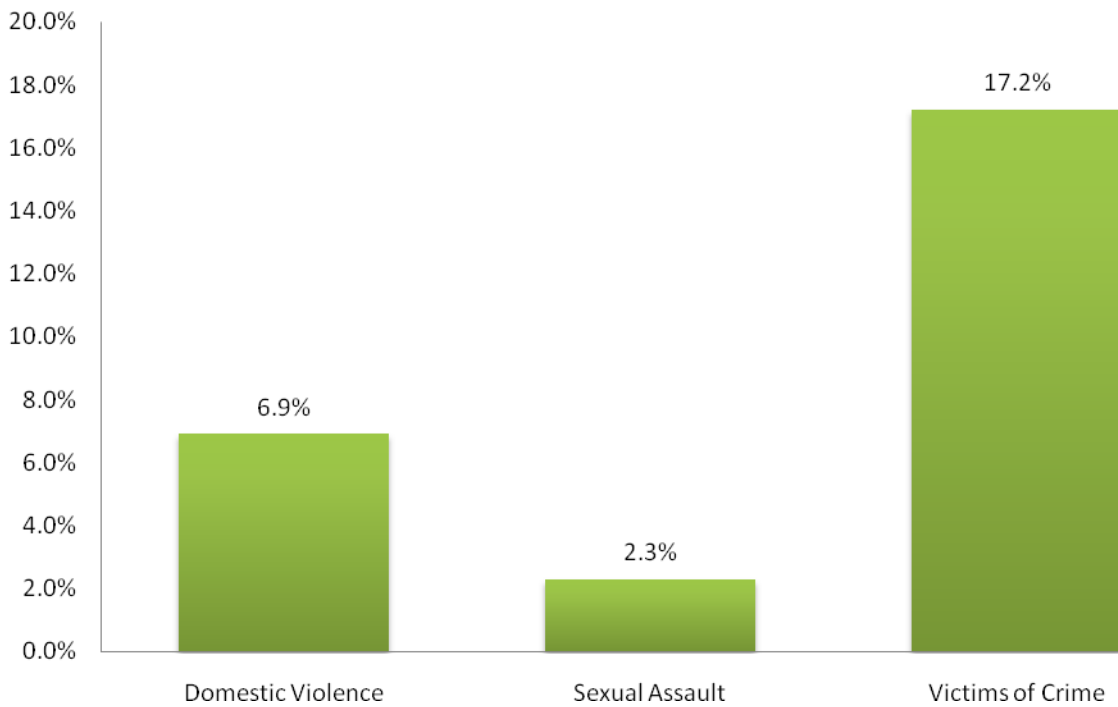
**Percentage Of Clients Indicating Refugee/Immigrant/Asylum Seeker Status**

## **Direct Client Services**

One of the most significant improvements of InfoNet over previous reporting methods is the ability to reveal the depth and breadth of the services advocates provided. Rather than relying solely on a headcount of total victims served, we are now able to better illustrate the services each client receives, the hours of services and number of contacts, and from there extrapolate information which can help us serve those victims better.

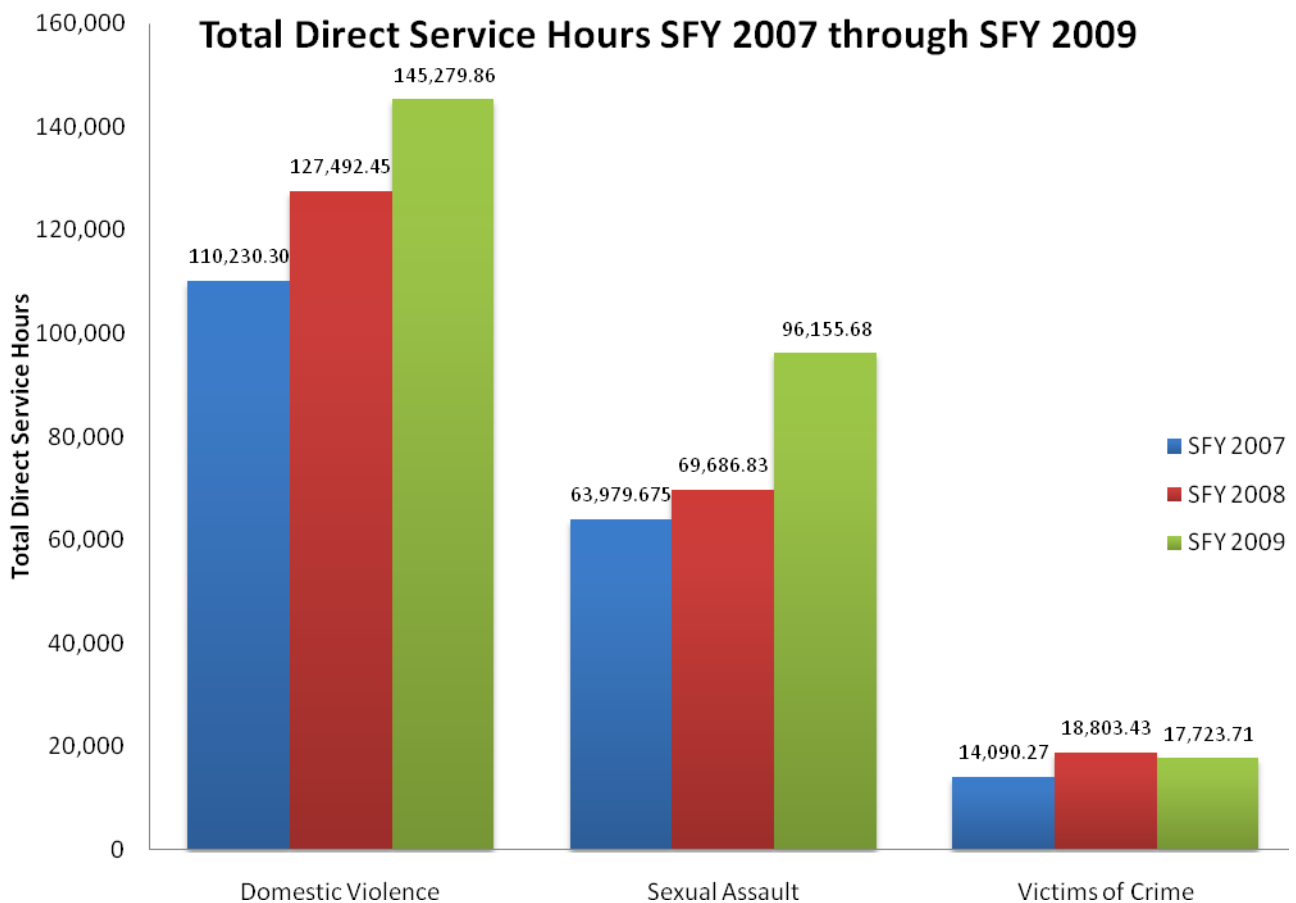

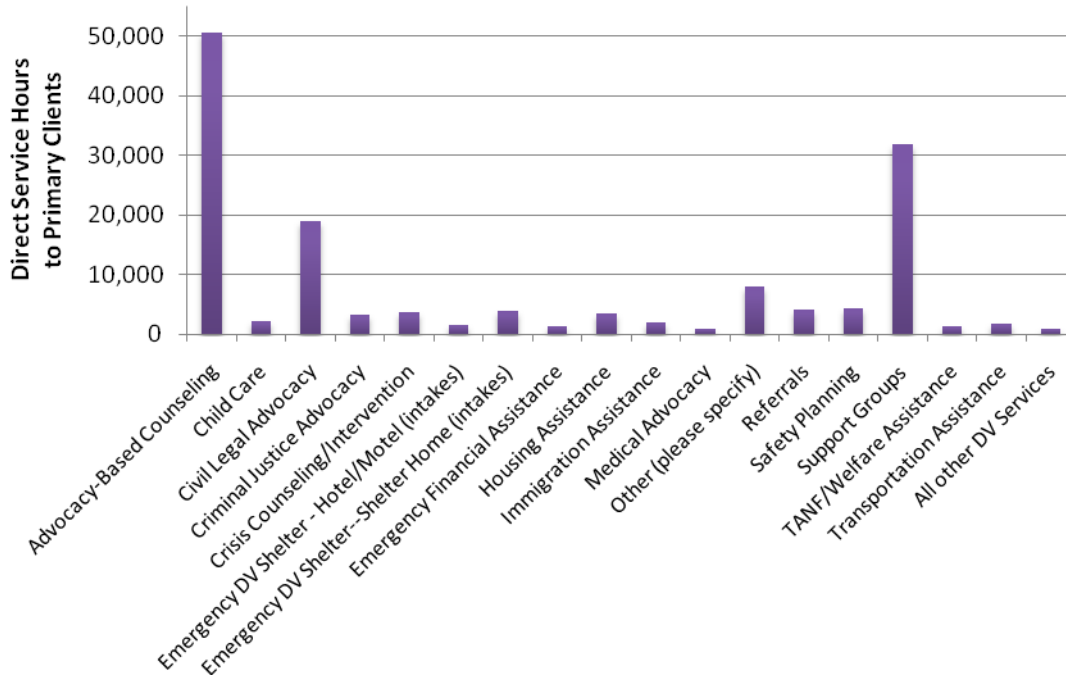

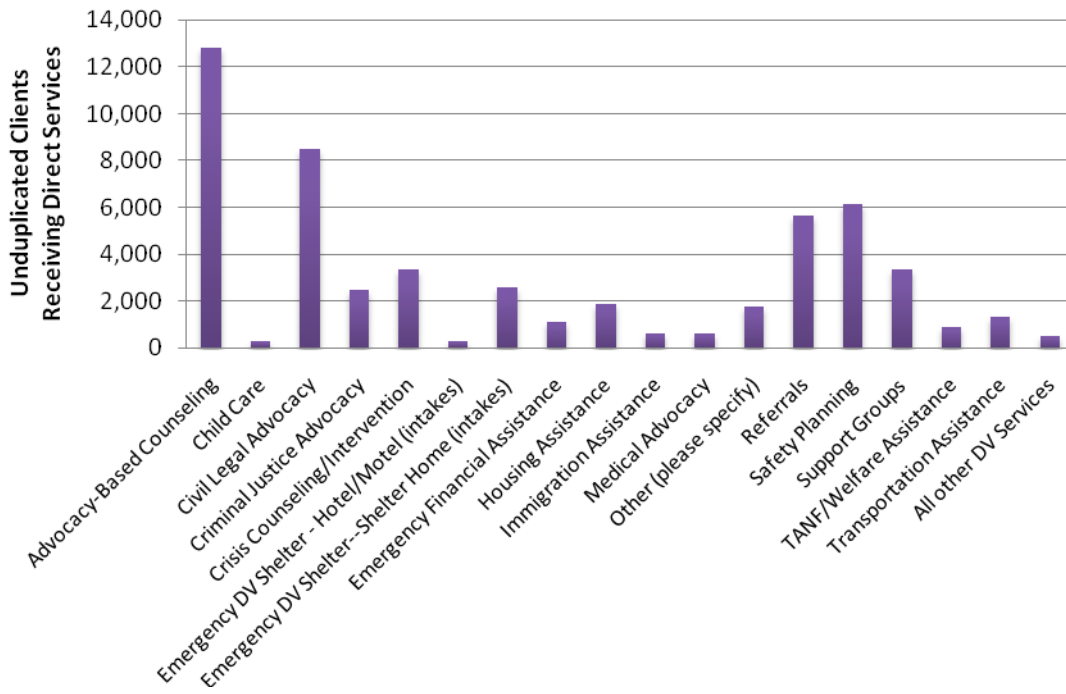

## Domestic Violence: Total Unduplicated Clients Served

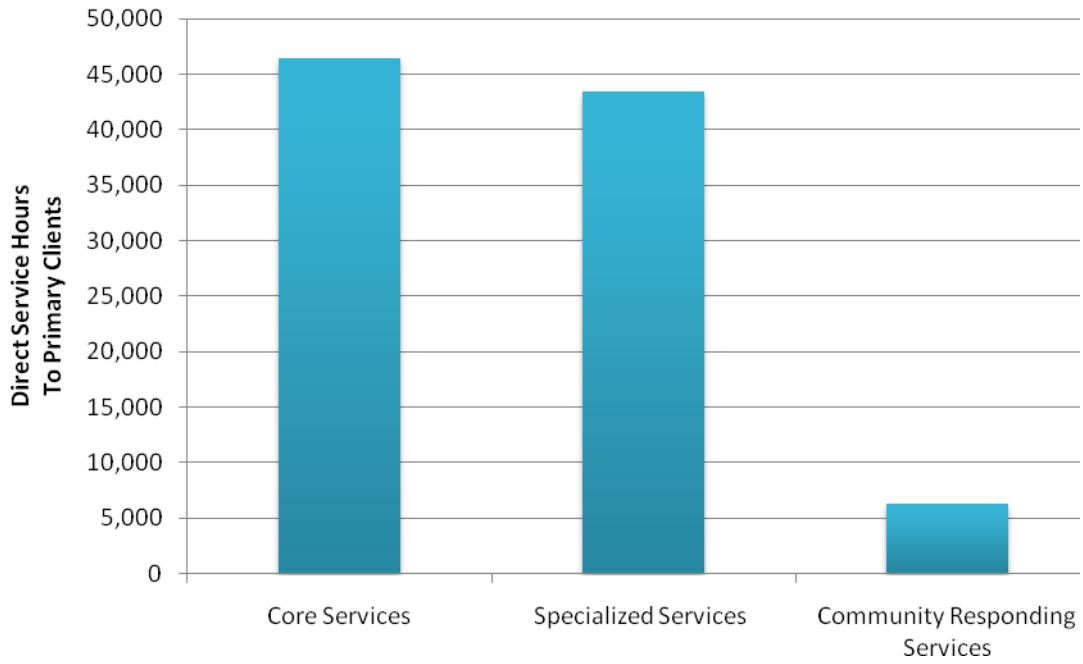

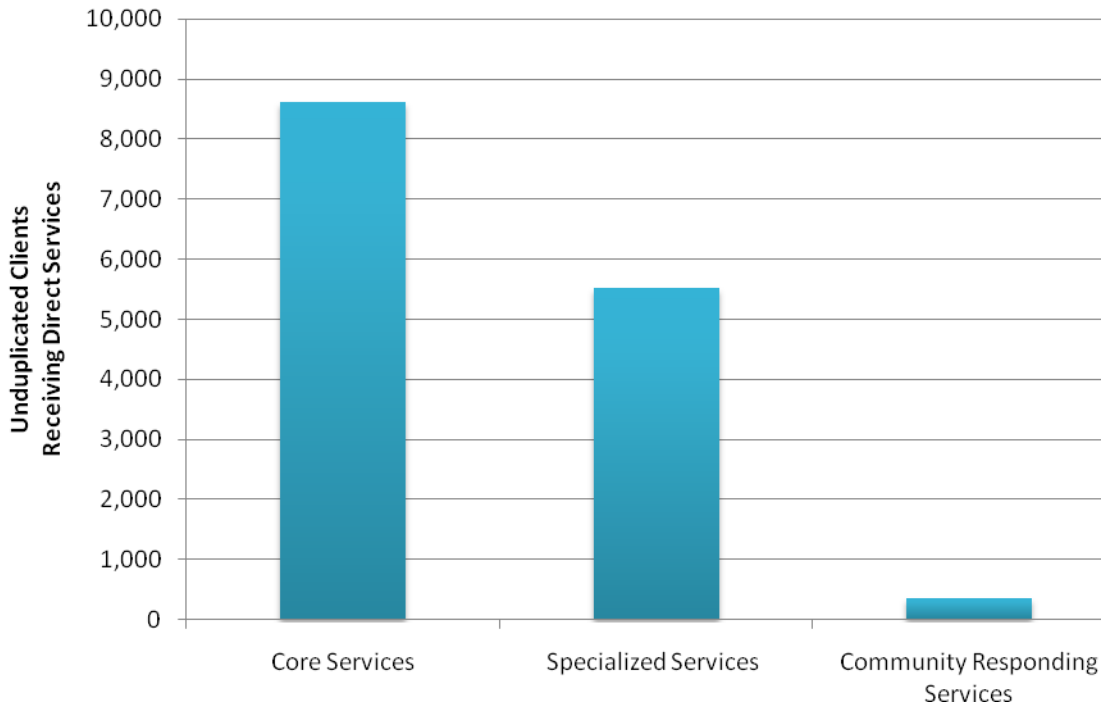

### Sexual Assault: Total Unduplicated Clients Served

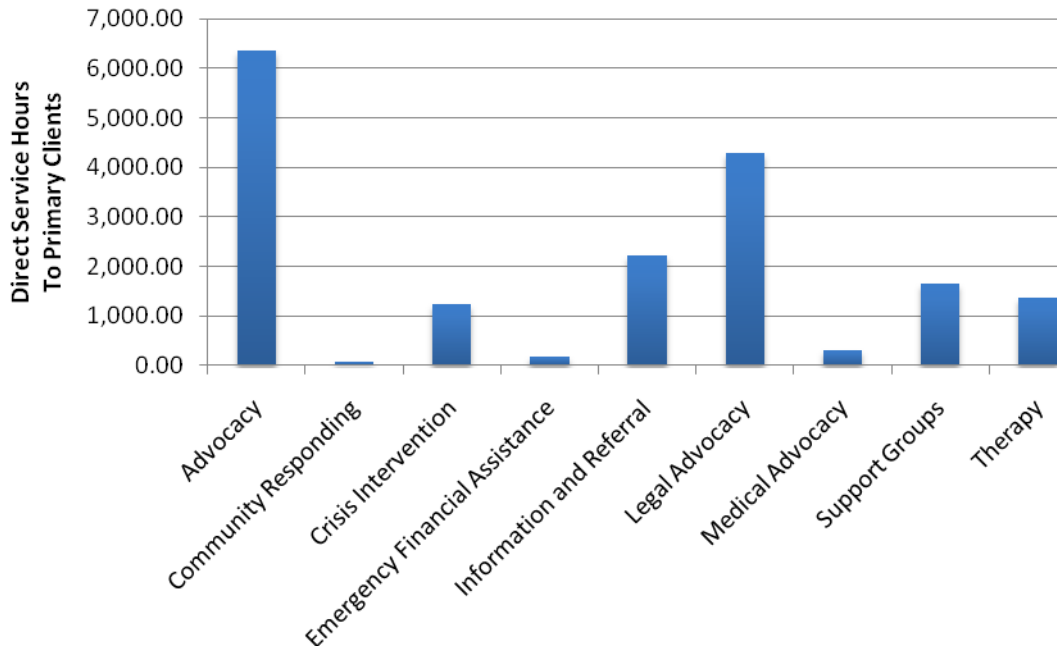

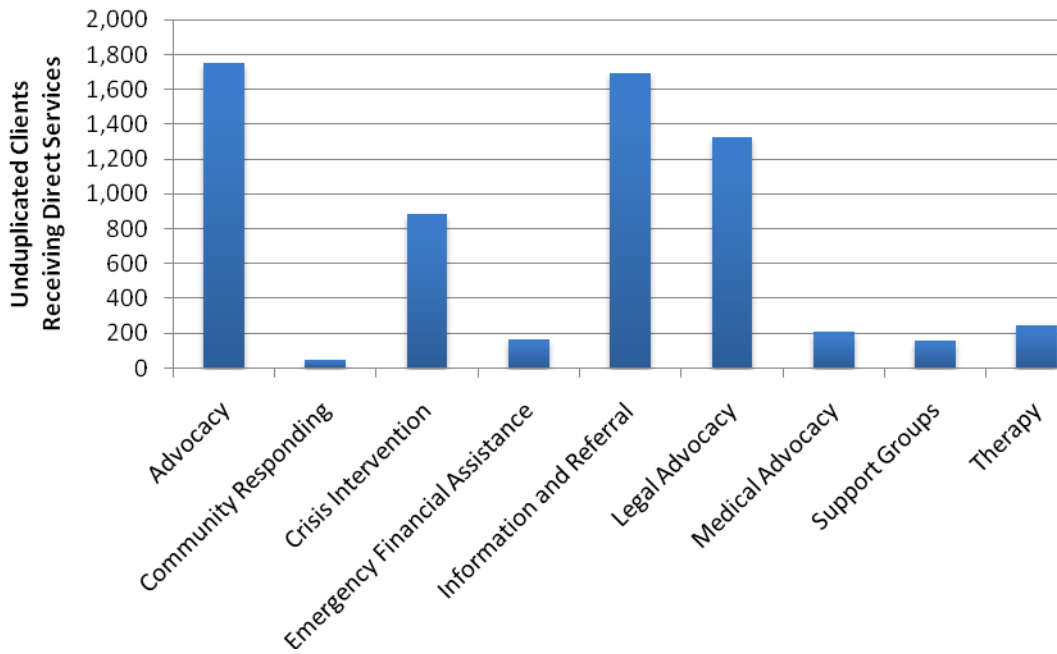

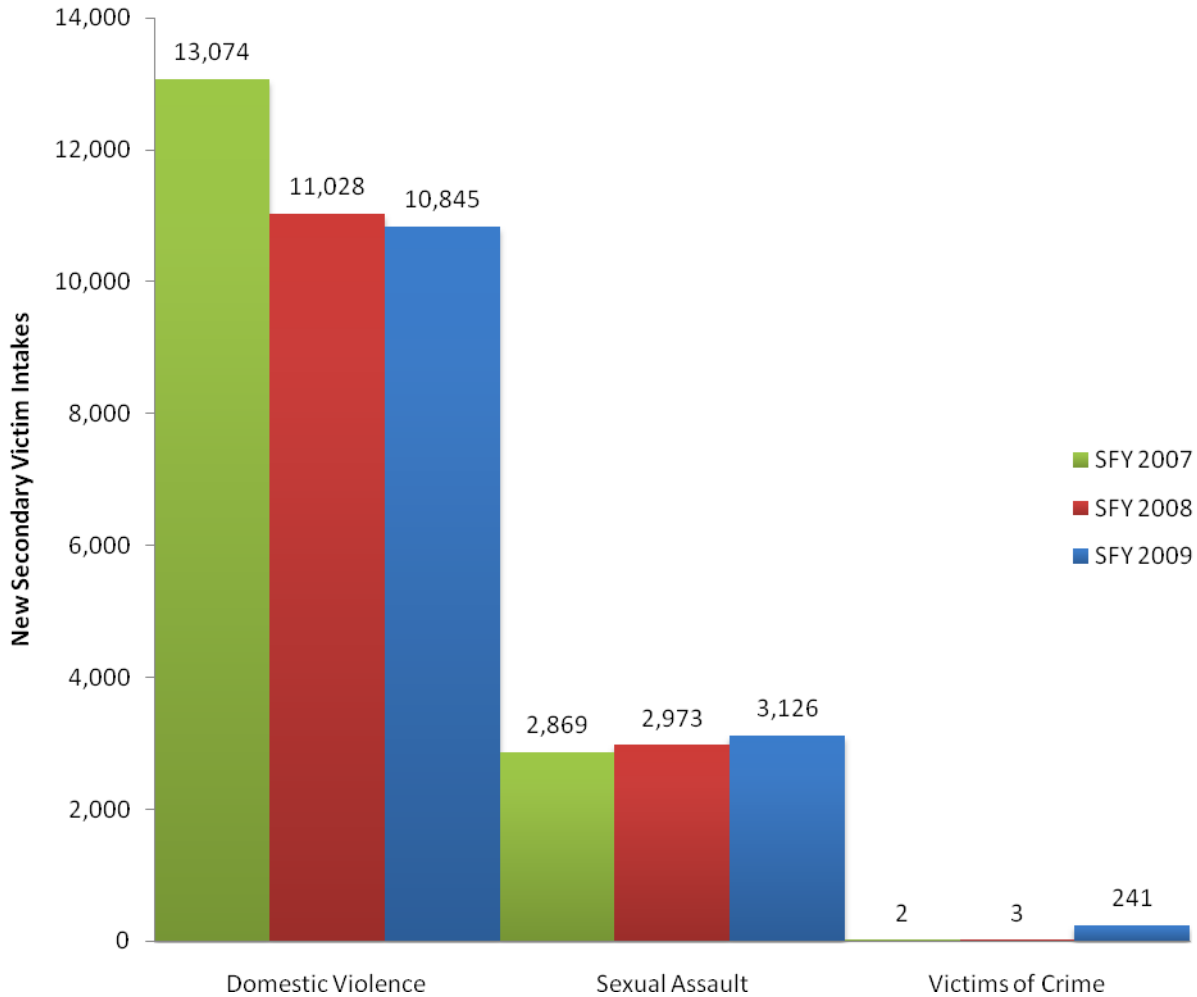

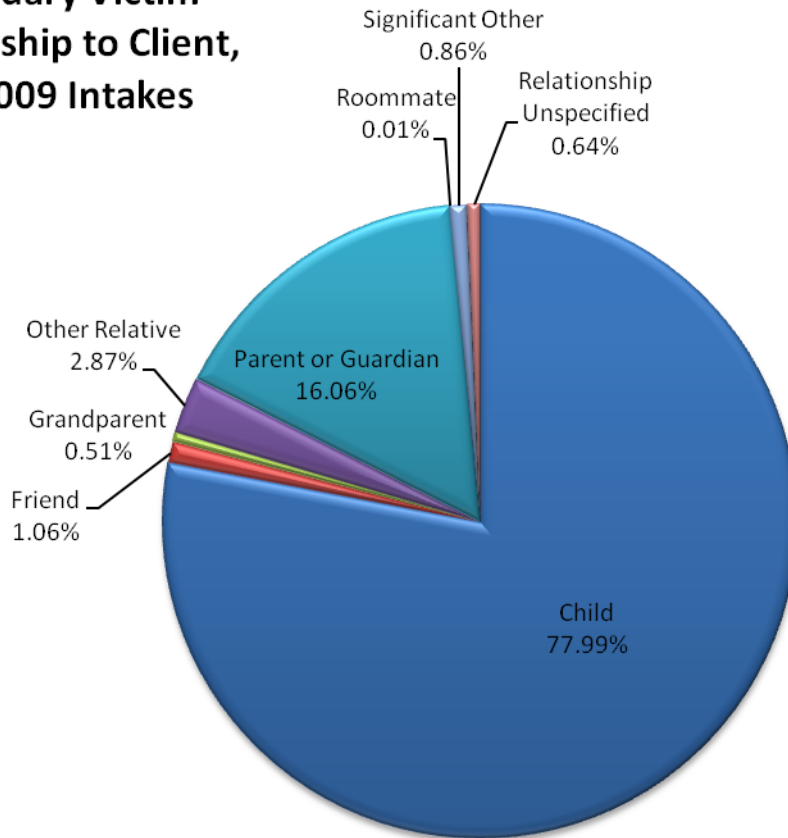
**New Secondary Victim Intakes

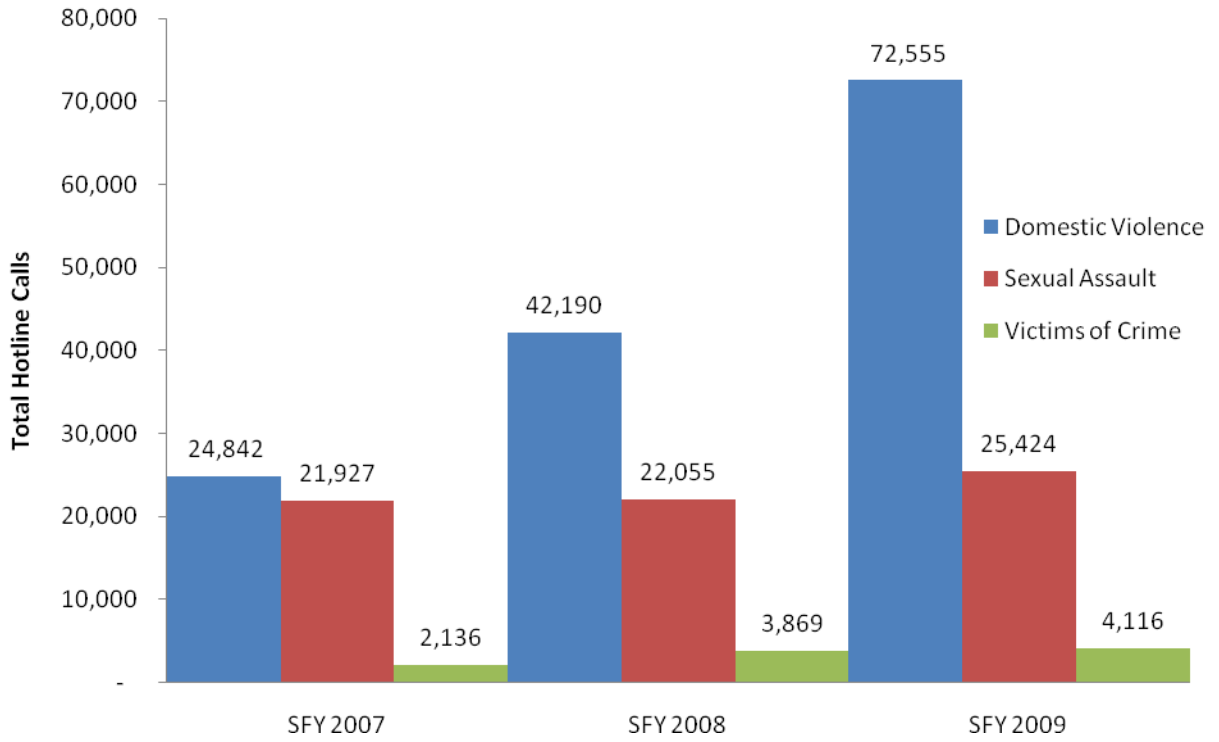
