



BoS CoC received a net increase of \$346,585 (not including increases due to FMR adjustments and our planning grant) for a total of \$8,730,488.

All projects in Tier 1, including our one reallocation (Serenity House), were all awarded funding.

In Tier 2, two bonus projects, one in Pacific county and one in Grays Harbor County were awarded funding. Both of these projects serve survivors of domestic violence and together they will bring an additional \$420,604 to our CoC for this purpose. This is great news and we send huge congratulations to Crisis Support Network and Grays Harbor County!



Unfortunately three renewal projects were not awarded funding. Our YWCA of Kitsap County, LIHI Fleetwood Tenant Stabilization, and Skagit ACT Housing projects will not be renewed. These are all very small projects (grant amounts total \$74,019) but were impactful to the people they served in those communities. All other renewal projects in Tier 2 were awarded funding.



- Makes recommendations on CoC level policy development
- The co-chairs are Annette Rodriguez and Mark Hollandsworth
- The CE subcommittee joins five other standing committees Families with Children; Veterans; Youth; Adults without Children; and Racial Equity.






BoS CoC Subcommittee Meeting Frequency Oct. 2019 to Nov. 2020
