# Guiding Principles Edits (Meeting #3)

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1. Prioritize sustainable, climate smart business models for the agriculture and forestry sector
2. Prioritize **resilient technologies**, universal, **affordable, reliable high speed** broadband, and digital equity for rural communities
3. **Expand and support** rural technical expertise and capacity building
4. Expand opportunities to finance resilient clean energy projects and infrastructure improvements
5. **Ensure the equitable distribution of clean energy projects**

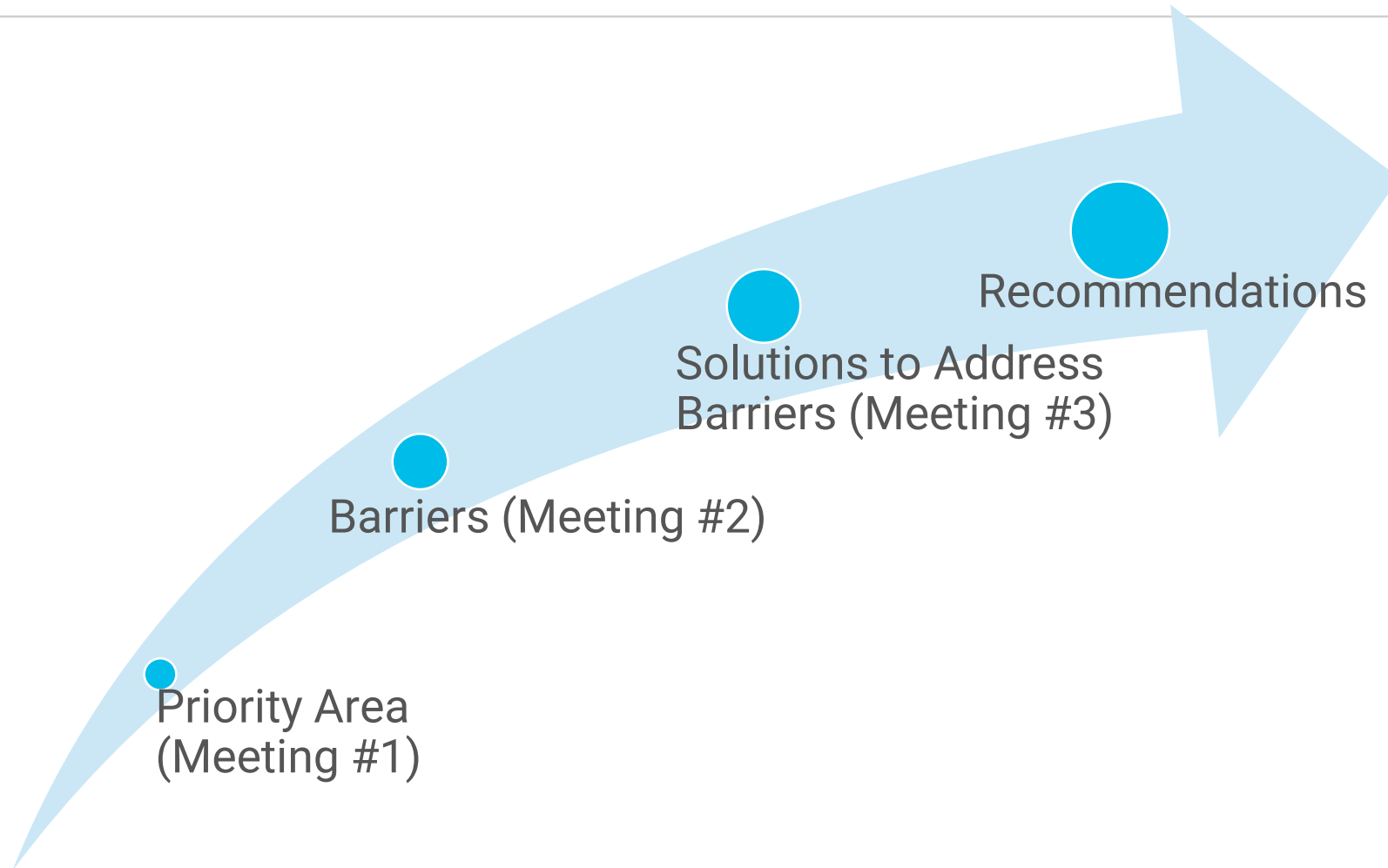
# Example draft recommendation (see handout)

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- **Guiding principle 3:** Increase access to opportunities around financing resilient clean energy projects and infrastructure improvements that also provide co-benefits for economic and workforce development 
- 1. **Recommendation:** Develop programs and policies that support rural grid modernization and resilience among remote customers
  - a) **Addresses barrier:** Aging or inadequate rural infrastructure
  - b) **Example strategies, programs and policy mechanisms**
  - c) **Specific Examples**
- 2. **Recommendation:** Invest in resilient distributed clean energy technologies for critical facilities, including but not limited to, drinking and waste water systems, communications infrastructure (e.g. radio & cellphone towers), healthcare facilities, emergency shelters

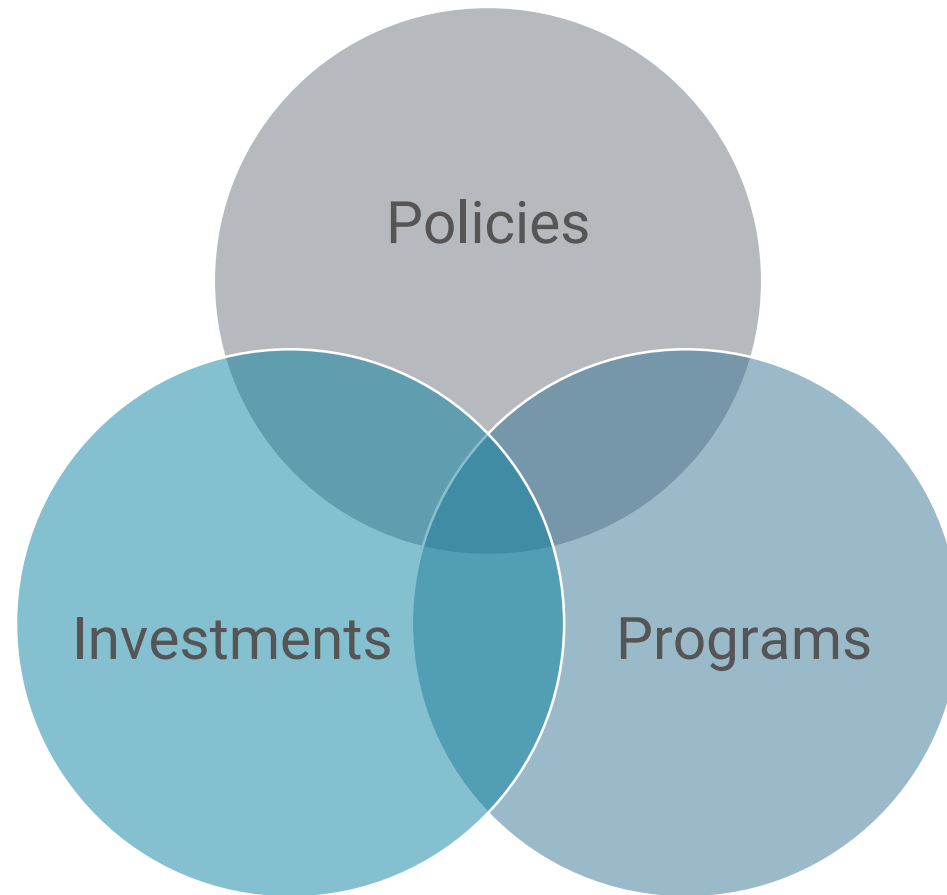


# Barriers to meeting the needs of rural communities (Meeting #2)

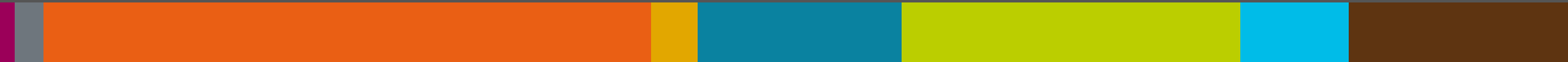
Score (importance x urgency)	Barrier
1.0	Lack of technical expertise for developing clean energy (projects)
1.1	Aging or inadequate rural infrastructure
1.5	Lack of programs tailored for rural use cases
1.7	Small government and rural community staffing capacity
1.8	Cultural and language barriers
2.1	Lack of workforce in rural areas to build projects
2.6	Access to information
2.9	Lack of access to capital
3.1	Rural utility role, mission and capacity
4.9	Global supply chain/COVID impacts
5.1	Rural communities attitudes (perceived or real)
6.0	Climate policy goals not considering forestry and agriculture industry needs

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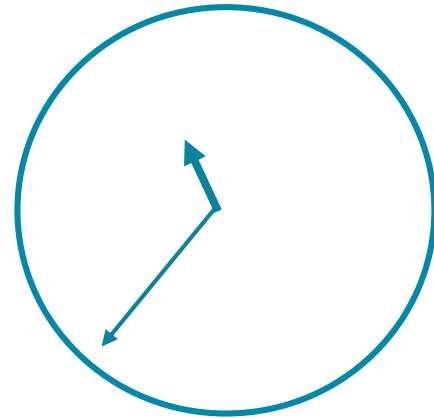
